


Agency for Home Affairs (in numbers)



Multilevel governance as key factor

- Clear choice to integrate Urban Policy in Agency for Home Affairs
 → Specific attention to relations different government levels
- Structural multilevel governance
- Acknowledgement of each other's roles, responsibilities, opportunities

We're the level of government closest to the majority of the world's people. While nations talk, but too often drag their heels cities act."





Why a specific 'Urban Policy'?

- Cities = places where new challenges occur first and strongest
 → Laboratory function + possible leverage
- Therefore cities most suited to offer answers to complex and interrelated challenges and transitions


BUT: in need for support: financial means, policy frameworks, knowledge sharing, capacity building, room for experiment,....

→ Role of the urban policy department = offer support through number of instruments



02 Urbanity

Concept urbanity (stedelijkheid)



The concept describes characteristics of living together in cities based on the 5 D's (in Dutch):

- Density (dichtheid)
- Diversity (diversiteit)
- Sustainability (duurzaamheid)
- Democracy (democratie)
- Digitalization (digitalisering)
- + Sixth D: Services (dienstverlening)
- → related to idea of proximity, as a way of strengthening the relations between cities, governments and the people in cities

Some of our instruments


- Urban renewal: investments, but "more than bricks"
- Neighbourhood improvement contracts
- Smart Cities with focus on open data, mobility and climate
- Cybersecurity

- → Common denominators:
 - Integrated approach
 - Place based, social-spatial
 - Sustainability (in its 3 forms: social, ecology, economical)
 - Cooperation between # levels on equal footing
 - Mutually reinforcing



Municipality-City Monitor








→ Policy based on facts (instead of intuition), consistently collecting, analysing and using data

4/5 satisfied with nature and green in municipality and neighborhood Almost 1/2 visits nature and green every month





Satisfaction with view on green from the house










Louvain - Built-up area











Satisfaction with nature and green in the city

Case Study 2 – 100 Neighbourhoods Platform

What? **Connecting platform** between local governments, experts, higher governments

- Placebased + specific attention for neighbourhood level
- Process and content related support
- Multilevel governance
- Laboratory function (pioneers) + possible leverage; room for experiment
- Knowledge dissemination & exchange of experiences
- LEKP-program as starting point
- Mix small, medium sized and big cities & municipalities
- Searching for systemic solutions
- Support 10 pioneering neighbourhoods/local governments



100 Neighbourhoods Platform - Discussion themes

Support mechanisms

- Link with other Flemish policy initiatives
- Individual vs collective support

Room for experiment

 Innovation: technical, social, financial, legal matters

Integrated neighbourhood approach

- Efficiency gains in collective approach
- Bottom up (starting from specificities local vs general top down)
- o Infrastructure works: combine!

Governance:

- From experiment to upscaling
- Capacity building
- Translation local → general lessons
